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# **PASTOR'S REFLECTIONS**

### **MISSION INCARNATE**

Last month, I accompanied the LGBT group to see Ava Duvernay's stunning new film, Selma. If you haven't seen it – you should. Somehow I had convinced myself that I was sufficiently familiar with the details of the Civil Rights Movement to watch the film



impartially, but I should have known better. I left the theater overwhelmed with the power of the story and its sad relevance to our present cultural moment. Cinema has the power to take textbook history and clothe it in flesh and blood. In art – as in life – there is no substitute for incarnation.

Incarnate life experience has been on my mind a lot lately as I've worked with a group of high school youth from Brown Memorial and Zion Baptist Church. Since ending our monthly

visits to Pedestal Gardens last May, we've been searching for new ways to build honestto-God relationships across lines of race, class, and neighborhood. In December, a small group of BMPA youth met with young people from Zion to talk about Ferguson, injustice, and the diverse experiences of Baltimore City teenagers. They are working together now to plan a joint high school youth event on February 20. There is energy in this planning that I believe comes (in part) from incarnation, that moment when "issues" become people and "people" become friends. If the desire for justice is, at its most organic, a desire to love your neighbor as yourself, then surely the first step is simply to know your neighbor.

We're in the midst of a congregational conversation at Brown Memorial about mission. What is mission? What is our mission? If the Greek root of "mission" means "sending," then where are we being sent to participate in God's work in the world? There is a critical theological link between the "sending" of mission and the "relating" of incarnation. We are sent to others and others are sent to us so that we might understand more deeply the indwelling of God's Spirit in all people. From that deep place of relationship springs justice and love and worship of the One who made it so. Mission truly rooted in incarnation shakes free of the colonizing, patronizing impulses that plague so many of our "missionary" efforts, freeing us to love our neighbors and receive our neighbors' love.

Selma paints a picture of that kind of beloved community, in all its glorious, difficult complexity. I like to think that our own young people are painting that kind of picture, even as we speak. As much as we would like to pretend otherwise, it is sorely needed work in a world that so quickly forgets its most inspiring stories. May we be open to the sending. May we be open to the relating. May we have eyes to see the God who (unexpectedly) meets us in that place.

## **Reflections on My Work Trip to Israel**

I went to Israel as part of a delegation of senior congressional staff members who handle defense/foreign affairs issues to visit/tour Israel's borders (Gaza, the Golan Heights, the border with Lebanon, and the West Bank/East Jerusalem) and to meet civil and businesses leaders in Jerusalem and Tel Aviv. I'm the Legislative Director for Rep. Elizabeth Esty, who represents Connecticut's 5th Congressional District.

Israel is an extraordinarily humbling place. There is a deep and universal connection to history and ritual shaped by historical contexts hundreds – and often thousands – of years older than any sense of identity most Americans possess. Anyone intent on affirming his or her preconceptions of the area and its people can



easily do so. However, my own preconceptions were pretty insufficient. That experience of admitting that I could not relate to or fully understand the life and motivations of the people I met – was humbling.



But it was also gratifying because it reminded me of the importance of a major theme of our experience here at Brown: being in relationship with others. If you want to understand someone, build a relationship with him or her.

From a policy perspective, I was enormously frustrated. Whatever your views of policy in the region might be, you likely find the status quo unacceptable. Yet there are simply no easy answers to any of the problems most people are motivated to address. Yet in many ways I'm more hopeful now because of the people I met during the trip. The lesson for me is to remember to choose people over polemics.


# Tiffany Series Concert Honors Our Own J. Spencer Hammond

Do you love African-American spirituals? Do the choral works of Brahms, Mendelssohn and Fauré transport you? You will hear both at a very special Tiffany Series CELEBRATION of "one of our own"– J. Spencer Hammond, who sings bass in the Chancel Choir. Spencer was Minister of Music at Douglas Memorial Community Church, serving with Rev. Marion Bascom for almost 40 years. His choirs were widely celebrated, and his men's choir sang at the White House in the 1970s for President Nixon.

The concert, which will be presented – with love – by the Chancel Choir, is Sunday, February 22, 2015 at 3 p.m. Michael Britt and Tom Hall will conduct; Michael and John Walker will play the organ. The M.C. for the celebration will be Rev. Chester France, and the event will include short reminiscences by friends and admirers. A reception will follow.

The program, which Mr. Hammond chose, includes pieces by the great African American composers R. Nathaniel Dett, Undine Smith Moore, Wendell Whalum, and Robert L. Morris. Also on the program are selections from Brahms' A German Requiem, and Mendelssohn's St. Paul, as well as works by Fauré and Franck.

The concert's concluding work will be Harry T. Burleigh's "My Lord, What a Mornin," which Spencer Hammond himself will conduct. Former

## "ALL THE WORLD'S A STAGE"

In *As You Like It*, the character, Jacques, proclaims "All the world's a stage. . ." Susan Stroupe believes this. In fact, her life could be the basis for a Lifetime bio movie. She was born into a long line of Presbyterian ministers, including her mother and father (Caroline Leach, recently retired Christian education minister and Nibs Stroupe).

Although Susan was born in Nashville, Tennessee, most of her young life was spent in Decatur, Georgia. Her parents were sent there to a dying church of 40 members (Oakhurst Presbyterian Church). By focusing on matters related to the LBGT community, racism, and injustice, the integrated church's membership increased to 300 persons.

Because of the church community, Susan and her brother felt very comfortable relating to people of diverse backgrounds. They developed an understanding of what it means to be in the minority. This knowledge served her well when she migrated to St. Paul, Minnesota to attend Macalester College. Originally drawn to the college by its liberal stance on education, Susan discovered that the area promoted a regional theater concept.

Susan took advantage of the many opportunities Macalester offered her as an English and theater major. One of those ventures was a semester of study in Cape Town, South Africa. After graduation, Susan worked for Americorps as an art teacher in Albuquerque and a puppeteer in New York State. Then she realized that she needed to expand her knowledge about her craft. This quest led her to Baltimore to study at Towson University where she earned an M.A. in theater arts. Additionally, Susan explored the fields of acting, directing, and playwriting.

John Tucker, Lynda Burton, and Hannah Murphy Buc are the links that prepared Susan's entrance into the life of Brown Memorial. Susan recalled that on her first visit to the church in 2010 when Hannah was ordained as a deacon, she was impressed tremendously by Andrew's sermon, the choir, and the sanctuary.

This multitalented young lady agrees with Shakespeare's character's idea of the presence of drama in every domain of life. She believes that theater and religion are closely joined. Her belief has been demonstrated in her coaching members in dramatic presentations, dancing in the light at Advent, and the Christmas pageant.

Currently, Susan is employed as an adjunct professor at the University of Baltimore, a teaching artist for Center Stage, and the director of *Mesmeric Revelations of Edgar Allan Poe*. The immersive theater drama about Poe will take place at the Historic Pratt House on March 26, 2015. Looking into the future, this busy thespian would like Brown Memorial members to explore "how we can integrate the arts into worship." Susan Stroupe is an excellent candidate to lead the church in this effort.
