Pastor's Message

central message of the Gospel is that God gives us enough. Enough basic resources exist for us all to not just subsist, but also enjoy the gift of life we've been given. Brueggemann argues the New Year is a good time for the church to reflect on how we may have been "recruited by claims of scarcity and how we may reverse course by receiving the abundance of love and sustenance given by God." "Scarcity does strange things to us" Brueggemann writes. "It makes us anxious, greedy, and quarrelsome."

The Annual Report is a good time to ponder the same sorts of questions, especially in a year where anxiety has been fueled by our politics and by the unprecedented level of violence in our city. Many are indeed, "on edge," waiting for the next bad thing to happen. More personally in the life of our congregation, I have found myself anxious about the vacancy in the Associate Pastor position, anxious about our financial situation, and anxious about the upcoming construction project.

What has helped me is to return to our abundanceannouncing texts, and to take a step back and see what is actually happening in the life of our church. Our Associate Pastor vacancy resulted from a developing leader in our midst (Tim Hughes Williams) hearing the call of the Spirit to take on more. Our remaining staff and many congregational leaders have stepped into the breach to provide some extraordinary leadership in the transition.

Our Associate Pastor Nominating Committee has worked tirelessly in recent months to position us to announce who we are and what we're looking for by the time you read these words. Our stewardship campaign has produced 125 pledges (so far) with more than 75 people increasing their pledges, 27 by more than 15 percent. A talented team of people has shepherded the construction work that is about to begin, producing plans for a space that reflects our commitment to diversity, welcome and inclusion—a space that will be more usable to our current and future needs than at any time since it was built. What is actually happening in abundance is in our midst.

Of course, none of this internal work necessarily changes the fact that, "we live in a political economy

that is propelled by a sense of scarcity that eventuates in mean-spirited fearfulness" (Brueggemann). But this wider reality only sharpens our congregation's reason for being: to participate in God's mission of reconciliation, repairing the breaches within us and around us in our city and in our world. So, children are getting tutored toward a gracious future, and hundreds of Baltimoreans have secured living wage jobs because of our work with other churches, and learning camps are connecting the talent in our church with those near and far who can benefit from it.

Underneath these examples (a few among many), is a small but persistent group of Christ's followers (our congregation), patiently building a community on the abundant economy of hope and gratitude and compassion rather than the economy of scarcity with its meanspirited fearfulness. Sometimes I wonder if the gift of this community is the greatest gift we can give to others, even more than the good deeds that emanate from it.

Here in this place we learn to cultivate the spiritual discipline of gratitude for what God is doing in the life of our church; we deepen our well of compassion for those in our congregation, our city and the world who cry out for justice; and we experience the satisfaction from working together to deepen the wellbeing of this church for God's purposes. The church is a central way that God employs to enable us to experience the joy of abundance in our midst.

Reading this year's Annual Report, it's easy to experience gratitude for what God is doing with us. May 2018 deepen that experience so we can continue to choose God's abundant, sharing-based economy over the fear that has filled so many hearts.

HIGHLIGHTS Congregational Life

We remained steadfast in 2017 with our goal to strengthen relationships while cultivating spaces for creativity and deeper meaning in worship and play.

- We began the year delving deeper into cross-neighborhood, One Baltimore work, by accepting an invitation from our closest Presbyterian neighbor, Madison Avenue Presbyterian, to worship with them on Jan. 15, 2017. J. Herbert Nelson, the Stated Clerk of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), was the guest preacher and we enjoyed a potluck lunch following worship.
- Call and Response" was our theme for Lent. We stretched ourselves and moved out of our comfort zones to respond to the sermon in a short conversation with a fellow worshipper. We also created a community art project using the words and phrases that resonated with worshippers. New words were added to the piece throughout the six weeks of Lent, revealing the image of a cross on Easter Sunday.
- Our weekly (Thursdays, 5:30 p.m.) and Lenten prayer services continued to be meaningful opportunities for personal and corporate reflection.
- We honored the 500 year anniversary of the Protestant Reformation with a sermon series this fall.
- Our Chancel Choir, Handbell Choir, Soulful Revue and Instrumental Ensemble continue to grow and feed the liturgical life of our church through a rich and diverse repertoire.
- Brown Memorial's first Composer in Residence, Haley Olson, joined the music staff.
- Our sidewalk summer concert series featured the musical gifts of Brown Memorial's members and was well attended by church members and residents within the neighborhood. Three summer hymn sings also took place on the church front steps.
- A Silent Film series took place in the Sanctuary, featuring organ accompaniment by Michael Britt. In all, the series raised more than \$1,000 for the Capital Campaign. Brown Memorial also hosted a Hurricane Relief Concert in October, featuring students from the Peabody Conservatory of Music and Chancel Choir member Thomas Sims, which raised \$1,500 for the American Red Cross.
- In 2017 the Tiffany Series presented: a concert by internationally renowned organist James David Christie; a panel discussion about Religion and the LGBTQ Community with members of four different faiths; and a Brass and Organ concert featuring the "top brass" of the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra and Michael Britt at the organ.
- Our Christian Education program was strong in 2017, with as many as 25 different adults helping in various teaching roles in 10 different classes. Thanks to everyone for your help!
- Our Youth participated in two great conferences in the summer of 2017: the Massanetta Springs Middle School Conference (five youth, two adults) and the Montreat High School Conference (11 youth, three adults).
- Sunday Night Live, Brown Memorial's monthly youth gathering, entered its third year in 2017. In September, we invited youth and adults from Memorial Episcopal and Corpus Christi churches to join us for a new "Tri-Church Sunday Night Live." This experiment will continue through May of 2018 and then be evaluated. This fall's SNLs were the largest ever, with as many as 40 young people attending. The group will begin meeting at Memorial Episcopal in 2018, as Fellowship Building renovations begin.
- We went small this fall even as we grow bigger with a congregation-wide small group experiment. The entire congregation was divided into 12 groups (roughly by zip code) charged with meeting a few times over several weeks. Eight out of the 12 original groups took off and a second iteration is in the works. Two "Faithfully Feminist" women's groups also launched this fall and our bar-based theology discussion group, Theology on Tap, continues meeting monthly.
- We closed the year with an improvisational pageant for everyone at the 11 a.m. Christmas Eve Service, followed by our traditional Lessons and Carols service at 5:30 p.m.

HIGHLIGHTS Mission in the City

Our urban witness in Baltimore extends from policy advocacy to monthly casseroles, but all of it is rooted in a sense of God's love for the city.

- Brown Memorial's youth continued to partner with BYOP (Baltimore Youth Organizing Project) in its efforts to build power for young people in Baltimore City. We welcomed BYOP to Brown Memorial for house meetings in January 2017, and supported them in large numbers at an April assembly with Mayor Pugh.
- We continue to volunteer at Eutaw-Marshburn Elementary School (EMES) throughout the year, including cosponsoring "Pictures With Santa" reward activity with the EMES Positive Behavioral Intervention and Supports (PBIS) Committee. Police officers from the Baltimore City Police Department provided Santa, elves and several other helpers to engage with the children.
- The EMES Choir is in its sixth year and going strong with 25-35 children practicing each Wednesday after school. A second year of EMES Choir Camp was held in July.
- Soaring Eagles Learning Camp began its sixth year with new partners from the Congregational Church of New Canaan.
- The Brown Green Team, which is committed to advancing environmental education and stewardship, enclosed a raised-bed vegetable garden at EMES in October.
- The Green Team also held a screening and panel discussion of the film "Merchants of Doubt," with more than 100 members of the community in attendance to hear from environmental scientists and journalists about the politics and morality of our response to climate change.
- We continue to help address hunger in our city by supporting the Samaritan Community with "green bag" food donations, and Our Daily Bread with monthly casseroles—more than 200 made by Brown members this year.
- We participated in the ecumenical Sanctuary Coalition of Central Maryland and presented the group's Sanctuary Tenets to Session in March where the document was unanimously approved.
- Sean Closkey of TRF Development Partners updated the congregation during a September post-worship lunch about the Oliver Community redevelopment and how the financial investment Brown Memorial made in the community is helping rebuild it.
- We participated in actions by Baltimoreans United in Leadership Development (BUILD) to organize Baltimoreans across race and ethnicity toward violence reduction across neighborhoods. An Adult Education class in April also focused on the difficulties and challenges our Hispanic neighbors are facing in the city of Baltimore, from harsh immigration enforcement, to violence in their streets.
- In November we held our first conversation focused on the opioid crisis and how churches can respond. A second was held in early January.
- In the Tutoring Program—our largest and oldest mission—spring 2017 assessments demonstrated that 94 percent of students improved their reading skills and 86 percent achieved either "significant" or "outstanding" improvement. Of the five who showed minimal or no improvement, two started in January and did not benefit from a full program year of tutoring. These students improved in ways that could not be demonstrated on an assessment. During the 2017/18 school year, 71 tutors in the Tutoring Program are serving a record 89 at-risk, low-income first through fifth graders. The program continues to work with Eutaw-Marshburn Elementary, John Eager Howard Elementary at Westside, Mount Royal Elementary and Baltimore Montessori Public Charter School.



HIGHLIGHTS Mission in the World

What does it mean to be in cross-cultural partnership, both abroad and at home? One thing we continue to learn at Brown Memorial is that it is complex, challenging, richly rewarding work.

- The Global Mission Committee helped spawn the idea of ministry teams earlier this year, which paved the way for the formation of the new Brown Memorial Green Team.
- In late 2016 a delegation traveled to Camajuani, Cuba to visit several churches as part of preliminary partnership explorations. Throughout 2017, the Cuba team continued its discernment process about a possible relationship with a Presbyterian church in Cuba.
- We continued our work with Maria Madre De Los Pobres, a Catholic parish on the outskirts of San Salvador supporting 20 godchildren through our Godparent program at the parish. We also hosted Wendy Torres from the Parish Council in March. Wendy updated us on all of the parish activities over dinner.
- The year 2017 marked the sixth year of the Pejuhutazizi Family Learning Camp (PFLC) at the Upper Sioux Community in Granite Falls, MN. Seven Brown Memorial families (11 individuals) participated. PFLC is one of four learning camps hosted by the Baltimore-Dakota Presbytery Partnership.
- Fern Cloud, pastor of the Pejuhutizizi Presbyterian Church, was the featured preacher at the September Presbytery Gathering and preached a sermon titled "Who Is My Neighbor?" Fern also was one of the panel members in a discussion on institutional racism with our Presbytery partners from Cuba and Guatemala.



NARRATIVE BUDGET 2018





The two pie charts above represent breakdowns of the 2018 budget by different areas of ministry investment and sources of income. The table to the right represents the major budget line items approved by the Session. These are two different ways of understanding the same budget.

"Endowment Draws (5% Allowed)" represents the amount that provides for the long-term preservation of the corpus of Brown Memorial's \$6.3 million endowment. "Endowment Draws (>5% Extra)" shows the additional withdrawal, approved by Session, to support the continued growth of the church. (This amount could also be considered the "gap" or "deficit" between our income and our expenditures). The 2017 numbers represent actuals, whereas the 2018 numbers represent budgeted expectations. The 2017 actual endowment draws were \$93,189 less than budgeted.

Worship Ministry

\$387,957

Provided by our Pastor Andrew Foster Connors (50% of compensation) and our future Associate Pastor (25%); our Minister of Music (70%); Choristers and Section Leaders and Director of Handbells (100%). Worship would not be possible without office support (50% Sharon Holley and 25% Sharon Lucas) and facilities staff (40%). Also, 50% of our utilities and insurance are included in this category.

Education Ministry

\$228,423

Provided by Rachel Cunningham, our Christian Educator (90%); Tim Hughes Williams, our interim Youth Coordinator (100%); and our future Associate Pastor (45%). Nursery workers also support our educational activities, which take place in the Church House and the upper floors of our Fellowship Hall (25% utilities). Administrative support is provided by Sharon H. (25%) and Sharon L. (25%).

Caring for Our Members

\$162,383

Pastoral care provided by Andrew (25%) and our future Associate Pastor (10%) is supported by the work of the deacons. This category also includes a significant portion of the compensation for Jennifer Michael, our Communications Manager (50%). Sharon H. (25%) and Sharon L. (25%) provide administrative supports. Rachel (10%) supports our membership through needs requests with CCB. Emergency funds meet the extraordinary needs of those in our community.

Mission and Outreach

\$270,632

Our church supports the Brown Memorial Tutorial Program in our building; the Baltimore Dakota Learning Camps; a long-term sister relationship with Maria Madre de Los Pobres Church in El Salvador; membership in various special agencies in the church. This category represents member contributions to trips and special offerings, and the time of Andrew (25%) - providing leadership in BUILD and NEXT Church, and our future Associate Pastor's leadership with our youth (20%). Admin. support is provided by Sharon L. (25%) and Jennifer (50%).
