Pastor's Reflection

"Close to Home" is the Advent theme we are using from *A Sanctified Art* this year and I'm excited to see where it takes us. From John the Baptist's preaching that hits "close to home" especially for those on the margins, to Mary who seeks comfort and support in the home of Elizabeth, to Jesus who is born on in the midst of a journey home, to the Magi who travel far from home to pay homage to Christ and have to find another way home to avoid entangling themselves or this newborn in the violently fears of a tyrant.

According to the authors of the theme, "Home is something we seek and something we are called to build." These words continue to echo

through my mind as we approach our long-delayed celebration of 150 years of ministry at Brown Memorial. For 150 years, hundreds of sojourners have found a home in our congregation. They found a home where the Gospel of God's love and justice has been proclaimed in word and deed, inspiring countless numbers of disciples to spend their lives in more just and generous ways than they might have without a spiritual home.

But others didn't find a home here. Even though racial segregation didn't seem to be part of Brown Memorial's stated history, people who visited Brown found a congregation where whiteness was the assumed norm. LGBTQ Christians endured a microscope to their lives as the congregation sorted through whether to state its unequivocal inclusivity or not. People with physical disabilities were unable to participate in all programs of the church, limited by physical barriers that communicated the ableist assumptions present at our founding. And those with limited means were relegated to the cheap seats by a pew rental system which mirrored the classist arrangements of the real estate structures in our city.

150 years of Brown has been the story of a home that many sojourners have found and also the story of "renovating" that home, hopefully to make more space for those who have been left out. As with most renovations, each time we change our home, our renovations can't help but reflect the cultural times in which we live but also the ethics that are a part of the congregation's heart and values of the time.

As we celebrate our history I see at least two dangers in our celebrations which I hope we will avoid. One is retelling the history of our home in a heroic fashion that neglects the truth of what we know about our own history. Some of that truth-telling has come into focus in October with the Anti-Racism Committee's deep dive into our history. Their research has shown the Brown family fortune included wealth gained by the active support of the slave trade. Their investment portfolio, at one time, came into possession of southern plantations—including enslaved human beings—that were sold to buyers. Even with the more progressive stances of the congregation itself, we can see instances in our history where the assimilationist racist ideas of our country informed our missional stances in paternalistic ways. For these sins we are called to repent and explore ways to repair the breaches that we have contributed to in Baltimore and beyond.

An equally dangerous approach to building our current home would be to imagine that we are so much improved from our ancestors in our own understanding of life and faith that our own errors and sins are far removed from their faults. I have yet to meet anyone at Brown Memorial whose own life choices are not somehow implicated in the unjust structures of our economy, our real estate markets, and our inequitable school systems just to name a few. We need a posture of humility not to signal our virtue, but to remain open and curious to the ways in which we all need to change—as individuals and as a community of faith so that justice might roll down more like the water that we pour into the font each week.

That's the kind of home I hope we are building together and not just for the sake of those who arrive on the corner of Park and Lafayette Avenues. Ultimately, the home that we build as a community is intended to point the way toward a home that all people deserve—the home that we can begin to see in the arrival of Jesus and his way, but hasn't yet come to fruition. I pray for wisdom, direction, openness, and faith—that we may correctly discern the best choices that God leads us to make in our time as we continue to seek a home with God and to build one worthy of God's dwelling.

Session News & Notes

The following are recent actions taken and reports received by the Session. Submitted by Laura Urban, Clerk of Session

■ The Return to Brown Team reported that they have reviewed policies for allowing facility use by individuals and groups, concluding that Brown will continue to allow use of the facilities provided the Facilities Use Policy and guidelines are followed. Session approved the Team's recommended changes to add a "COVID-19 Safety Acknowledgement—Liability Waiver and Release of Claims" to be completed by outside groups using the facilities currently.

Received report from the Anti-Racism Task Force, which has currently three main focuses: (1) National history focus, using the book Caste: The Origins of Our Discontent, by Isabel Wilkerson, as a group reading experience this summer; (2) Brown Memorial history, which is the focus of the Adult Education class in October, led by Taylor and Tom Steward; and (3) Small groups, which have been put on hold, pending the public health situation.

Updated health benefits for nonclergy staff to seek more equitable offerings to all employees, regardless of hire date.

Approved the Investment Committee's recommendation to update the Investment Policy. Changes to the policy allow us to "green" the endowment portfolio by reducing overall exposure to certain fossil fuel investments to less than 1% and set an overall limit on our exposure to those investments as well as the weapons sector.

Approved Bylaws for the Brown Memorial Tutoring Program. The program is organized as a separate 501(c)3, but the program "is a part of the Brown Memorial Park Avenue Presbyterian Church. As such, the powers granted to the Tutoring Commission and program staff are subject to review, approval, and amendment by the Brown Memorial Session." Oversight for the program is managed by the Commission, which is to have 12 members, including 1 Session Member and 3 other members of Brown Memorial.

Heard a report on the Missions Committee, which is convening in November to discuss a new structure, after long-time chairwoman Julie Hanks has stepped down from that role.

Heard confirmation that a defibrillator has been installed in the entrance hallway off the courtyard (near the bathroom between the Assembly Room and the Sanctuary).


Brown has always been that kind of church. Sally Shoemaker Robinson, 2021

In 1975, Saigon fell and many of us remember the horrific pictures of Americans and Vietnamese refugees huddled on the roof of the American Embassy hoping for rescue. In 2021, we again were assaulted with horrific pictures of Americans and Afghani refugees, cramming into the international airport in Kabul, hoping for rescue.

In September, 1975, Brown Memorial stepped up and quickly offered housing to a Vietnamese couple—Kim Minh and Dong Que Le. The Le's were resettled from Vietnam to Indiantown Gap Army Base in Lebanon, Penn-sylvania. In 1975, more than 20,000 Vietnamese and Cambodian refugees were housed at this post until they were processed for sponsorship in the local area and across the United States.

The Le's lived for 18 months on the third floor of the Brown manse, next to the church house. Members from Brown Memorial/Woodbrook assumed all of the logistical responsibilities. Brown Memorial Park Avenue paid all the bills. They resided there until the Associate Pastor Manse was sold at which time Sally Robinson's mother, Helen Shoemaker, offered the State Bedroom in her home to the couple at Burnside in Baltimore County. The couple had family in California and in June of 1977, they made their way to the West Coast to be reunited with them—but not before they attended the wedding of Sam and Barb Robinson with Kim Minh adorned in a Vietnamese National garment—the Áo Dài.

So we find ourselves in 2021, again faced with refugees who have had to flee Afghanistan after the American with-



drawal from their country. And Brown is stepping up again. The Brown Memorial Ministry of Welcome is joining with Memorial Episcopal and residents of Bolton Hill to assist with the resettlement of 10 Afghani's who are making their way to the US as humanitarian parolees. We have already contributed nearly \$3000 to defray the cost of fees related to obtaining Humanitarian Parole. Six Brown families have volunteered to be host families and we recently are collected enough household supplies to support 12 newly-arrived families.
