Ministry Staff Message

2021 was a mixed year for Brown Memorial.

eing honest about it gives us the best chance of facing our current situation with courage and compassion for ourselves and others in our community. There is much to be thankful for including the fact that our community, at its foundations, continues to demonstrate all kinds of stability and strength. We are blessed with so much in the way of resources — intellectual, financial, and spiritual; resources that are directly attributable to the commitment of so many of you who give yourselves freely to God's ministry and mission through the church. Leadership of our congregation continues to dig in across so many different aspects of the life of the church from the Return to Brown committee which continues to help us navigate our transitions in and through the pandemic, to the Anti-Racism Steering Committee, to the 150th Anniversary Committee which produced an incredible Stories of Hope and Faith book and a successful celebration of our 150th Anniversary in the middle of trying times. A new Christian Ed community worked tirelessly around a new Sunday morning schedule and then shifted completely when the pandemic returned with a vengeance. Worship has taken us on all kinds of journeys through faith that connects with our current times and struggles — from Democracy and Faith in January to the Habits of Faith Stewardship series culminating in a successful capital campaign which met our goal of \$600,000 just before the printing of this report! The Green team has plowed ahead with all kinds of opportunities to assist in the healing of God's good earth while the music ministry has demonstrated heroic efforts in bringing all kinds of music making back into the sanctuary and then out of it again as conditions dictated.

We've also struggled, most notably with attendance, in all areas of the life of our church particularly in education with children and youth. Our staff and leadership have gone above and beyond trying all kinds of approaches beginning with zoom Sunday School then shifting to recorded lessons for families with young children whose schedules have been completely upended, then finally to outdoor Sunday School this past fall. Several rounds of intentional listening underscored the fact that many families have been pushed beyond the edges of their margins, both in terms of

their tolerance for covid risk (when most children were vaccine ineligible), and in terms of their time and energy. While zoom has been an invaluable tool for the church, it's also not the ideal environment for children. All of us are sick of zoom, but some have had as much as they can take.

The larger church continues to struggle with meaningful connections beyond our gatherings for worship. Our very well attended church picnic at the end of the summer demonstrated our hunger for connection, alongside a congregational climate survey which revealed some important fissures in the fabric of our connection. Our annual stewardship campaign hasn't yet reached its goal. Early information suggests that while most families have increased their giving, the numbers of people who are giving is slightly down.

All of these challenges make sense, given the reality of where we are in the world. And while we continue to try various approaches of engagement, there is also the reality that no program, discipline, or activity that we create together can change the underlying reality of the trauma that we are all living through to various degrees. Together we can process the significance of this time in history together and find spiritual resources to cope as we work through it, but processing and coping will, in the end, be less than satisfying to a congregation that actively seeks ways to transform the world around us, not just adapt to it.

And yet, as Andrew shared in a recent sermon, all of the adapting and flexing that we have practiced together in the last couple of years may also be strengthening muscles that we need the most to face not only the current situation,(I think) the ongoing democratic instability and changes to the climate that are part of our future missional reality. The pre-pandemic church wasn't as prepared to meet these challenges as we are today and will be tomorrow.

The real question, then, for the coming year is how do we care for ourselves and each other in the face of so much overwhelming anxiety, trauma, and personal and public turmoil? While the staff doesn't have the answers, we do have some food for thought and conversation that we hope to process with you and



with leaders from our congregation on Sunday, January 30 during the education hour and beyond. The first is to be attentive to your own need for rest, safety, and compassion. What relationships do you need in your own life and how might you reorganize your time to make sure you are taking steps to prioritize those needs? This compassionate stance toward yourself will put you in a better position to extend compassion for others in your life including fellow church members who are likely struggling in their own ways which may be similar or different from you. Finally, what do you need from your church and what kind of energy and time would you enjoy sharing in order to make this a reality for you alongside others? The church, after all, is not a business that extends products to consumers. It's not a nonprofit program created to assist particular groups of people. It is the people of God — the body of Christ —formed and shaped by members who are connected to one another through the grace of God.

As your staff we share many of our community's frustrations in surviving this pandemic. We have learned ourselves what it means to redefine success at a time when so much is outside of our control. We remain committed to working together to create the kind of spiritual depth and community connections that we can while accepting limitations outside of our control. We hope to see many of you on January 30 when we take stock of where we are, celebrate what we've been able to accomplish together, and look forward to the coming year.

150 ANNIVERSARY

Brown Memorial Presbyterian Church Re-Dedication

On December 5, 2021 we marked the end of our 150th year on the corner of Park and Lafayette Avenues. The Celebration began at 9:30 a.m. with the creation of a time capsule which is now housed in the columbarium for future generations to open and learn about our past and present. The worship service that morning at 11 a.m. featured music from the very first service of worship in 1870, highlights from our recently published, Stories of Hope and Faith, and music from our Handbell Choir, Chancel Choir, and Soulful Revue. We celebrated the second Sunday of Advent that day as well as communion.

Following the worship service, members, friends and visitors were invited to explore some of Brown Memorial's history displayed in the church house, the assembly room and the chancel. Emily Davidson, archivist at T. Rowe Price, donated an in-service day to Brown Memorial in order to set up the exhibit in the Speers Room in the Church House, and we appreciate her time and expertise. Light refreshments, aligned with COVID safety protocols, were served. Later, in the afternoon at 4 p.m., a special music concert was held at the Christadelphian Chapel located in Catonsville, Maryland. The Chapel houses Brown Memorial's original pipe organ (1870) built by Hall and Labagh in New York City.
