#### ANDREW'S MESSAGE

Doing church differently as we move forward...

During a recent lunchtime conversation about hospitality, many of you were asked, "What are the things we do well that serve as a strong welcome to all persons who come to Brown Memorial?"

The conversation was rich and included examples such as the genuine way the peace is passed, a meal every Sunday after church, nametags, and wearing whatever you want to wear to church. A new member offered, "This is a very outgoing congregation—people come and find you, greet you and say welcome." A visiting family chimed in that they noticed that, "You welcome people from all places in their Christian journey, all talents are welcome, and all parts of the person." They went on to say that they appreciated that we are a More Light Church, explicitly welcoming LGBTQ members.

Additionally, members value the welcome offered by members at the front door, the ministry of the deacons, and the choir. The conversation was a solid reminder for me that the most important things that we do to serve as a strong welcome are not things that happen "from the front" but rather an extension of welcome that occurs through the efforts of many of you.

That strong welcome is one of the many reasons that the Session and I have discerned together that Brown Memorial Church has a resonant message to share at this point in the history of our community and the larger world. That message is rooted deeply in the history of our community, which has sought to live out the Gospel in relevant ways that are as generous and just as God's grace.

## Thankfully, we now have a staff aligned with that primary objective.

To refresh your memory, last year, the Session charged a task group, established by the personnel committee, to realign our staff in a post-Covid world to better meet the strategic objectives that Session had established.

Those objectives include deepening and expanding our relational culture, centering the church's missional identity in worship and education, and growing the congregation. We hired a consultant who helped us design a staff structure accordingly, and we implemented that plan, which included a new Congregational Life Minister, Administrative Assistant, and part-time Communications Managers while also formalizing the Youth Director and Pastoral Care Minister positions.

Communications Manager Angie Alt was hired in July, and she's hit the ground running, updating our website with staff photos, bios, office hours, and some redesign. Administrative Assistant Camille Sherriffe started in September, and she's quickly and tactfully improved the way the staff communicates with each other, streamlined some internal processes, and is getting educated more quickly than I thought possible in CCB, our internal database so that she can get more of our congregants using its features for our joint work together.

These are just a couple of examples of the work staff is beginning to take on. As we continue this transition, the staff understands that our primary mission is an equipping one.

We're here to facilitate the discipleship work of the entire church, most of which is carried out by many of you.

As we make those opportunities for participation and leadership more transparent in the days ahead, I encourage you to welcome our new staff members (we're introducing and reintroducing them on the following pages). The best thing you can do to support them is get involved! The joy of hospitality—engaging with each other whether we are welcoming new friends or being welcomed into this community of faith—is the blessing that often happens in the encounter.



I can't wait to see what God will do with all of us as this year continues to unfold!





#### **TUTORING UPDATE**



The Brown Memorial Tutoring Program is ushering in its 61st year of service with a new Program Director and logo! Karlin Scudder assumed the leadership role after Martha Socolar retired in June. We have also welcomed a new Assistant Director, Liam Luckett, to the tutoring team.

"I am looking at the new year ahead of us with passion and excitement as we push the Tutoring Program forward into its seventh decade. With the support and hard work of our veteran tutors plus many new faces, we're proud to be helping elementary school students in their journeys to becoming independent readers and writers." ~ Karlin Scudder

We are again partnering with Mt. Royal Elementary School, Dorothy I Height Elementary School, and the Baltimore Montessori Public Charter School. We have 56 returning tutors and 19 new volunteers working individually with 85 students (up from 75 last year!) in weekly 75-minute sessions from October through May. We are happy to report that eight of our tutors this year are members of the Brown Memorial Church!

This past summer was a busy one preparing for the new Tutoring Year. One major project completed was the overhaul of our June Carr Lending Library to make it more appealing and accessible for both students and tutors. First, we organized our bookshelves, removed outdated and severely damaged materials, and identified areas where we could use new titles. More exciting, though, was implementing a new online library management system, Libib, through which we digitally cataloged nearly 4,000 volumes. With this software, the Tutoring Program now has a searchable (by title, author, topic, etc.) database of all library resources, and tutors can more easily search for books that will interest their students and get them checked out with just one scan on a smartphone.



#### THE TIFFANY SERIES RETURNS

A committee has been formed under the leadership of Brown Memorial's Minister of Music, Michael Stefanek, to bring back The Tiffany Series, which was first established in 2005 and directed by Shirley Parry.

Over the years, the series has presented a wide variety of concerts in various musical styles, including recitals utilizing the church's 1930 Skinner organ, handbell and brass festivals, choral performances, and even Appalachian bluegrass artists. Speakers included actor, singer, and political activist Harry Belafonte, Marian Wright Edelman, founder and president of the Children's Defense Fund, and Congressman Elijah Cummings.

Andrew believes God is alive and active in the world. Our great joy and challenge is to notice when and where God is present, calling us to join in the healing work of loving our neighbors and transforming the world together in more just and generous ways. Convinced that the Gospel really does mean "good news," Andrew strives to nurture ample servings of creativity, humor, joy, and generosity in the life and mission of Brown Memorial. He brings more than two decades of pastoral leadership experience into Brown, a church that continues to stretch itself toward greater inclusion of all people in church and society.

Andrew's passion for community transformation has been profoundly shaped by the discipline of community organizing, rooted in the proven conviction that diverse groups of people can change the world when they organize their power together. From 2010 through June 2021, he served as clergy co-chair of Baltimoreans United in Leadership Development (BUILD), a local affiliate of the Industrial Areas Foundation (IAF) and Maryland's largest citizens power organization. In 2016, Andrew shared a *Baltimore Sun* "Marylander of the Year–Honorable Mention" with two colleagues for their leadership in negotiating the most significant community benefits agreement in Baltimore history. He continues to serve on BUILD's vision-setting Strategy Team.

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From 2023-2024, Andrew served as the Moderator of the Presbytery of Baltimore and currently chairs the Presbytery Cabinet. Believing that faith calls us to expand our knowledge and understanding through engaging many disciplines, he is pursuing a Certificate in Psychoanalytic Studies at the Washington Baltimore Center for Psychoanalysis.

Andrew is a native of Raleigh, NC. He attended Duke University as a B.N. Duke Scholar, where he received a B.A. in History with a focus on contemporary social movements. He holds a Master of Divinity from Columbia Theological Seminary in Decatur, GA. Andrew was the 2001 recipient of the prestigious David H.C. Read Preaching Award and has preached at numerous conferences and events nationwide. A resident of Baltimore City, he serves on several non-profit boards and is a frequent contributor to scholarly journals.

Andrew is also the proud father of two children, Anna and Aidan.



In early 2019, Gretchen received a call from Pastor Andrew asking if she could help out at Brown Memorial while he was on sabbatical. She knew immediately that was the only offer to lure her out of retirement for the third time. After years as a solo pastor, the opportunity to work with an extraordinary team of colleagues in a church committed to an inclusive urban ministry was irresistible.

Soon after arriving, Gretchen knew that she would want Brown to become her church home, so she returned later that year to worship with her new friends and affiliate with Brown as a (non-staff) Parish Associate. When a need arose in September 2023, she returned to the ministry team in a part-time transitional position, which was formalized in mid-2024.



As her job title reflects, the most essential part of Gretchen's work is helping the Pastor and Deacons to provide pastoral care for the congregation which, as she has gotten older, has become one of the most enriching and replenishing aspects of ministry.

But Gretchen also loves liturgy and teaching and is grateful to be preparing the liturgies for Sunday worship, sharing in the leadership of the Wednesday Bible Study, and helping as needed with Faith Exploration, the Sunday afternoon adult education program.

Gretchen received her M.Div. from Harvard in 1976, then moved to Baltimore and spent seven years as Chaplain and a lecturer in the Department of Philosophy and Religion at Goucher College and nine years as University Chaplain at Johns Hopkins. She then decided to try parish ministry. However, few churches were calling women at that time, so she became certified in interim ministry and began serving congregations in that capacity. After completing three interims, she received a call to serve as Pastor of Springfield PC, so she and her husband, George, left the city and moved to Sykesville.

Gretchen loved that church deeply but, in time, realized that she missed the city and that her gift was in interim ministry, helping congregations to navigate often difficult transitions and prepare to receive a new pastor. She and George moved back to Baltimore, where she served two more churches as Interim Minister before retiring and, then, two more churches in brief "bridge" positions before retiring again and becoming a yoga teacher (which now continually shapes her understanding of ministry). Then there was Brown. Gretchen is home.



#### REKINDLING A 38-YEAR RELATIONSHIP WITH MARIA MADRE DE LOS POBRES

Recently, an intergenerational delegation of Brown Memorial community members traveled to El Salvador, rekindling our 38-year relationship with Catholic parish members of Maria Madre De Los Pobres.

In 1986, right in the middle of the 12-year-long Salvadoran Civil War, Brown began sending delegations to San Salvador. They've continued every two years since, supporting, witnessing, and accompanying parish members. After the 2018 delegation, though, the pandemic interrupted this regular touchpoint between our congregations.

On June 22, Brown members were able to reunite with our Salvadoran friends, spending a week in and around the parish neighborhood, plus traveling to other areas of El Salvador. The 12-member delegation included five young people on their first trips to the country and seven older adults, Barbara Cook among them. Barbara, who has been on five delegations, shared visit details and moving insights from the first trip back in six years.

#### Visit Details and Insights

One of the most important parts of delegation trips is connecting with the children sponsored through Brown's "God Parent" program. Members commit \$350 annually to Maria Madre parish children, which provides for school tuition and books, uniforms, shoes, and medical exams. Delegates visited Brown's 17 "godchildren" in their homes, shared letters and gifts brought from their "godparents," and spent time with them in the community. Barbara noted that it's always impactful to witness their day-to-day lives.

This year's delegation also focused on the plight of prisoners in El Salvador's vast prisons. Barbara was greatly inspired while meeting with the women of Holy Spirit Island just off the coast, as they find strength daily to advocate for their innocent husbands. Brown delegates are petitioning US Embassy representatives for help in these unjust cases.

When asked if there was a moment on the trip where Barbara felt a particular closeness to God, she remarked, "Yes, when we visited the chapel where Oscar Romero was assassinated." Catholic Archbishop Romero, now a saint, was a vocal critic of violent government forces during the Salvadoran civil war. Barbara said she felt sadness but also an overwhelming gratitude for the sacrifice he made.



#### Passing The Torch

Barbara's respect for Romero is reflected in her and other community members' dedication to the Brown Memorial-Maria Madre relationship over the last 38 years. She emphasized several times that Brown delegations are not missionary acts but accompaniment.

The continuity of that accompaniment relationship is now dependent on "passing the torch," as Barbara says. A new generation of Brown community members must take the lead, connecting with new generations of Maria Madre parishioners and continuing Brown's work of "... taking every opportunity to respond...to the places of pain and injustice in our...world where God is already at work."

#### SHARING A MISSION WITH OUR PARTNERS IN CUBA

This July, members of the Brown Memorial Cuba Partnership Team—Sarah Ramirez-Cross, Morgana Kinlan, and myself—traveled to Camajuaní, Cuba, to co-lead a vacation Bible school (VBS) with our partner church, Iglesia Presbiteriana de Camajuaní. VBS was a joint effort: Brown Memorial provided a teacher-of-the-year quality curriculum (created by Sarah), while our partners adapted and translated it for the children and the congregants who helped. **This year's theme was "Having hope when you are afraid."** 

VBS took place in the morning over three days, with attendance increasing each day. On the first day, we had approximately 30 attendees. But, by the final day, the number of attendees had doubled in size to 60 children! We were told this was partly because the children had spread the word about the VBS and were bringing their friends. In addition to a well-deserved (and much relished!) snack time, each day, the children made crafts, sang songs, did LOTS of drawing, and, of course, learned about what the Bible teaches about hope in the face of fear.

Our partner church has a vibrant youth program, and like us, they are continually looking for ways to attract more children. VBS is one way that the church does this. Attendance is open to not only youth congregants but also to the community at large. Since each day of VBS includes a meal, this can be especially beneficial to children from homes with fewer resources.

On the afternoon of the last day of VBS, the staff walked to a local swimming pool to celebrate a successful event and experience some much-needed R&R. During the walk, I recognized several children who had been at the VBS playing outdoors. As we passed them, I realized that although I'd been to Cuba several times before, this visit had allowed me to experience a new aspect of the Camajuaní community.

When visiting in the past, we primarily spent time with the adult members of the congregation, particularly the more senior members, several of whom had come to watch their grandchildren at VBS. Our interactions with the community's youth were typically in the context of Sunday school, the worship service, or coincidental encounters with children of church employees. The VBS allowed us not only to get to know the youth but also to witness and participate in the church's youth ministry as a whole.

One of the cornerstones of Brown Memorial's mission is engagement in the community and the world. The VBS illustrated another way our partners in Cuba share and live the same mission.

As we deepen our partnership with the church, we deepen our partnership with the community of Camajuaní. As that deepens, we see more and more of Christ's presence and our siblinghood with not only our partners but all the Cuban people.



#### YELLOW MEDICINE FOR THE FAMILY

This year marks our family's second visit of a week-long stay below the massive blue sky amongst the wind-swept prairie of indigenous land in Granite Falls, MN. At the Pejuhutazizi Family Learning Camp (PFLC). A spiritual/cultural exchange concept that the Dakotas initiated in the late 1990s. To me, it is reparation work.

Pejuhutazizi translates as "Yellow Medicine." Many lost the definition when their aural culture disappeared. Through listening, connection, trust, and healing happen here.

Our children grow excited to see their PFLC friends weeks before we leave. One might assume it is the preparatory meetings that organizers Chrystie Adams and Julie Hanks conducted months prior where we learn the Dakota language, the history of their half-millennium holocaust, and recollect their values from The Lakota Way. But our kids invest in the relationships created the year before through technology—a text thread, Snapchat photos, and Facetime calls—all year.

Like summer-long camp, the youth are expected to take on leadership roles and participate in self-sufficiency. After a five-hour travel adventure, PFLC inaugurates at the Upper Sioux Community Center. With the start of our daily roses-and-thorns session, a community-building process designed to embrace constructive positivity from every voice.

After attending church across the road, the following day is devoted to camp preparation. We unload and organize books, science experiments, movement activities, Dakota art, robotics kits, and games. Upon completion, the campers and junior counselors play outdoors, hoping the Upper Sioux neighbors will join them on the basketball court.



We unplug from technology and interact according to our camp-assigned roles. For the next four mornings, Minister Fern Cloud administers each person a smudging of sage. We spread the cleansing herb around our bodies and pray for mental health. We sing Hanhanna Wayuhice Kta, Isaiah 50:4 from Dakota Odowan (Dakota Hymns), a document missionaries of the 1800s created to preserve the disappearing Dakota language.

Baltimore counselors lead the age-specific sessions. Some feel at home with the comfortable silence their fellow campers provide. Unseen connections grow visible with the juxtaposition of Dakota art alongside the reading, science, and STEM activities. Eureka moments abound.

Upper Sioux is connected to the Dakota War of 1862 when the US government abandoned its treaty to provide food in exchange for indigenous land. Together, tribal members and Baltimore staff provide comfort food for the campers throughout the week.

PFLC creates a safe space. The Baltimore campers have a nightly slumber party. Some of the children in the community ask to stay longer than camp. Kickball night is filled with pizza, friendly rivalry, and new and unexpected friends.

The weekends at the Wacipi—the PowWow—are filled with the pulsing beat of drums and sporadic singing in the air. Our friends are meticulously dressed in their intricate and meaningful regalia, prepared to celebrate their culture and history. Some from our group are invited to dance. We run into friends. We let our children go off with their own friends as though we would in our neighborhoods at home. We feel integral to the community.
